





United Methodist Corner

One of Wesley's major teachings in Methodism is holiness of heart and life. Holiness of heart are spiritual practices such as prayer, Scripture reading, meditation, worship, communion and fasting that enable us to grow in our love for God. Holiness of life or social holiness are practices, such as acts of mercy and justice, that enables us to love our neighbor as ourselves.

A spiritual practice that has gained in popularity in contemporary spirituality is St. Ignatius Spiritual Exercises; namely the Examen. The Examen is a daily spiritual discipline consisting of five parts. There is no direct evidence that Wesley drew from Ignatius' Exercises in his writings, but their thoughts on spiritual growth being a lifelong journey are closely aligned.

Spiritual director, Mark Thibedeaux, helps us to remember the different parts using an R pattern: request, relish, review, repentance and resolve. Request is taking a few minutes to ask for God's presence to come to you in a way you can recognize and rejoice. **Relish** is looking at the past day and recalling those experiences and events of which you are especially grateful. Sometimes, we can take life for granted, forgetting how much God cares and loves us. **Review** is taking a prayerful look at your past day. Where were you blessed? Were there situations where you hurt or offended someone? Did I neglect or do or say something? Where was God present that you may have overlooked? **Repentance** is about feeling remorse for something that has transpired for which we need to repent. The scriptures speak to the need to "die with Christ". We die with Christ when we "die to those actions and words that impede us from experiencing Christ's transforming presence. Finally, Resolve is trusting that tomorrow will be a new day because God is working in your life, bringing to mind all those joyous things for which you can be thankful, encouraging you to examine your life in the light of His merciful presence, offering forgiveness as you turn in repentance for past sins, and bringing you hope for new beginnings.

For me, the most critical step in the process is review. Socrates once said that an unexamined life is a life not worth living. From a spiritual perspective, when we examine our lives, we are opening our souls to the healing and transforming power of God. That step can really make life worth living because we are seeking to follow God's will and purpose.

Our Annual Charge Conference will be on Sunday, November 9th in Fellowship Hall after worship, to review our ministry, receive reports, and adopt goals recommended by the church council. Narcan Fund

Opioid overdoses seem to occur in two parts of the population: the young, who believe they will never die and who are sometimes willing to experiment on their bodies, and the elderly, who are often prescribed opioid pain-killers and who sometimes forget that they have taken their medications, leading to an inadvertent second pill and a resulting overdose.

Narcan is an over-the-counter nasal spray used to treat known or possible opioid overdose. Being over-the-counter, no doctor's prescription is needed to buy it and no special training is needed to administer it.

Last year we installed AED defibrillators in both the church and the FAC. It is now proposed that we install Narcan cabinets next to the AED cabinets, thus making sure that the drug is readily available in case of need.

Two wall-hung Narcan cabinets, complete with alarms, signage, instructions, the drug itself, and installation are available for about \$550.00 in total. A special fund has been set up to collect donations and your help is requested. Please mark your gifts "for Narcan." If you have any questions, Jan Young will do his best to answer them.

Volunteer/Committee Opportunities

Hopefully you've seen "Serve Joyfully" is part of the new vision for the United Methodist Church. The church's call to serve joyfully is not about adding more to overstuffed schedules. Jesus never served out of obligation. His service was not mechanical or strategic. It was deeply personal and joyful. He washed feet. He fed crowds. He restored dignity. He touched the untouchable. And all the while, he served with joy, not because it was easy, but because it revealed the nature of God.

There are plenty of opportunities to serve joyfully at Grand Avenue Church this coming year. Several of our committees have people finishing multi-year commitments and are in need of new members to continue the committee's work. Please take time to prayerfully consider serving joyfully in one of the positions listed below.

Lay Member to Annual Conference

A lay leader representative to an annual conference is an elected member of a local congregation who serves as a voting delegate and liaison to the larger conference meeting, representing their church's interests and sharing information. Their responsibilities include participating in conference sessions, voting on legislation (except clergy-related matters), and reporting back to their local congregation and church council after the conference ends.

Trustees Committee - several opportunities

Effective trustees will function as Christian stewards of property God has entrusted to the congregation. This includes supervising and maintaining both the physical property of the congregation and gifts made to the congregation so that the ministries of the congregation can be effective and all legal requirements related to the property are satisfied. This team has oversight and care of all local church property, buildings, and equipment to further the mission of the church.

Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) - several opportunities

The staff-parish committee is charged with managing employee relations and serves as the liaison between the pastor and staff, and the congregation, to promote an effective ministry. They develop job descriptions, conduct interviews, hire, and evaluate all staff positions (pastor, pastoral assistant, administrative assistant, and organist, as needed. They also support, strengthen, nurture, and encourage the pastor and staff.

Administrative Council Member at Large

An "at-large" administrative council member does not hold a specific leadership role like treasurer or committee chair, but represents the general membership. They participate in the council's work of envisioning, planning, and implementing the church's mission and ministry, and also help interpret the actions of the annual and general conferences.
