

Pastor's Message

I'm proud to be a United Methodist. That may sound rather strange considering all the inhouse squabbles we have been having within our denomination. But I reached this conclusion after hearing the story of the tornado that destroyed much of Mayfield, Kentucky including First United Methodist Church. Pastor Joey Reed of First U.M.C. was interviewed afterwards. He and his wife had miraculously escaped injury while hiding in a crawlspace in the basement of the church. They asked him how do you navigate through such a loss and destruction. He spoke of the United Methodist Church being a connectional church. We are connected and are in covenant with other United Methodist churches here in the U.S. and across the globe. He spoke about how a neighboring United Methodist Church had invited his congregation to worship with them. He spoke of how the disaster relief coordinator and others will come and assess the damage and create a plan to assist them. Other United Methodist Churches will send financial support and even volunteer teams to help with Mayfield's cleanup. I had mentioned in a sermon that God will help us through the unthinkable. We are never meant to handle things alone. The First U.M.C. community is surrounded by other United Methodists through which they can lean on for support. We are partners in serving Christ.

What I really appreciate about the United Methodist Church is that we don't just seek to minister to people's spiritual's needs alone. We seek to minister to the whole person; spiritually, emotionally and physically. The premise behind our Regional Mission is that we can have a regional outreach and presence through shared staff who can lead us to be Christ's body in the world. Our SPRC is presently reworking the job descriptions that will address Grand Avenue's priorities for the future. More information on this process will be forthcoming. In the meantime, I will be collaborating with Mark Weaver to see where we can find areas for cooperation and collaboration between our communities of faith.

As we begin this new year in this season of Christmas, I offer these profound poetic words from the late Howard Thurman:

When the song of the angels is stilled, when the star in the sky is gone,
when the kings and princes are home,
when the shepherds are back with their flocks, the work of Christmas begins:

to find the lost,
to heal the broken,
to feed the hungry,
to release the prisoner,
to rebuild the nations,
to bring peace among the people, to make music in the heart."

We've just learned about a 93-year-old woman who helps on a project using plastic bags to make mats for the homeless! The plastic bags are smoothed out, cut into strips, and then crocheted into mats 6 feet long by 4 feet wide. **It takes 800 bags to make a mat this size.** The homeless use them to sleep on; it keeps them dryer and warmer. What a great way for us to recycle our plastic grocery bags!

Self-Control

Happy New Year! It seems the start of every new year comes with the start of everyone's new year resolutions and, if that is true for you, I wish you the best in keeping whatever goal or promise you made to yourself. It is easy to renege on these commitments as other obligations and habits quickly resume their normalcy in our daily lives so, remind yourself why you thought it was worthy of a new year resolution and stick to it. These are usually goals we set in the new year because they are things that have slipped or evaded us in the past but are truly important to our health, our well-being, our peace of mind, our happiness so, don't sell yourself short.

When it comes to self-control, it is all about choosing to do what you should even when you don't want to – it is not always easy but, with God's help, we can stay in control of our actions, and our choices. As we follow Jesus throughout our lives, the Holy Spirit transforms us and helps us live more like Jesus. We can follow His example and choose to do what we should do, instead of just what we want to do. The Holy Spirit can give us the power and wisdom to show self-control.
