

Hello Grand Avenue Church Family and Friends,

As we transition from the warm days of summer to the cool days of autumn, I am struck by how the seasons mimic the conditions of this life. The changing circumstances of life are like seasonal transitions. That is to say, our lives move from periods of light and warmth to times of cold and darkness. In this seasonal metaphor, the sunny warmth of summer represents periods of comfort, contentment, joy, and happiness. Fall is a season that represents life's struggles, creating a transition from light and warmth to cold and darkness. Winter represents periods of darkness and despair and spring exemplifies times of renewal and rebirth. Light to darkness and back again, over and over.

The one notable difference in this metaphor is that the seasons of our life lack the consistent regularity of the seasons of nature. In our lives, we can have summers that last only days, while we may experience the changing turmoil of fall for years. Perhaps we experience such hardship or grief that our lives are plunged into a seemingly endless winter. While none of us want our metaphorical summer to end, to struggle and suffer, we can say with certainty that, like the changing seasons of nature, changes in the seasons of our lives are unavoidable. Trials and tribulations will visit our doorstep and we will experience the rain and chill of fall and the dark, bitter cold of winter. This metaphorical cold and darkness is not physical but spiritual, but just like the physical seasons, the only way to return to summer is to experience spring.

Spring is the season of rebirth and renewal. For us, metaphorically, this means a rebirth of spirit. To have our spirit renewed from the only source of life – God. This is the only means to endure the trials of fall and escape the torture of winter. Spiritual restoration cannot be achieved through any other means. This is the truth I cling to as I consciously and prayerfully seek to leave my winter.

So, as we navigate the seasons of this life, let us be mindful that even when the cold and darkness seem impenetrable, we must trust and seek God, so that His spiritual spring may restore the sunshine of summer to our hearts.





As a new school year begins, we are excited to kick off a new year of programming at Lighthouse as well! We had a great summer including a middle school service night in Milwaukee, a fun evening of worship at Lifest in Oshkosh, and of course, our week-long service trip to St. Louis!



The middle schoolers traveled to Milwaukee to serve dinner at the Guest House, which is a men's shelter. We assembled fruit and veggie cups and we took those with us to serve alongside pizza, soda, and desserts to the guests staying there. The boys worked hard and had a great time helping out, and afterwards we enjoyed the opportunity to tour the facility and learn more about the work they do to help those experiencing homelessness in Milwaukee.

In July, our small but mighty team of 3 high school youth and adults set off for St. Louis where we had the chance to partner with seven different service organizations in the community including food banks, a thrift store, an organic farm school, a child development center, and a furniture warehouse. We also had opportunities to learn more about some systemic issues in St. Louis such as racial inequality and socioeconomic divides in various neighborhoods that further exacerbate issues of poverty. In addition, we took time each day for worship and devotions and had time to explore the city and have some



fun together as well at places like the City Museum, Union Station, and the Gateway Arch. It was an incredible trip, and be on the lookout this fall for the opportunity to see pictures and hear more stories from the trip participants during/after worship coming soon!

With a new program year just around the corner, I'm excited for what the year will bring as we continue to welcome, empower, and equip students to be all that God creates them to be. United Methodist Corner

United Methodists have been charged with not being Bible believing Christians. This charge of late centers around our refusal to condemn homosexuality, but there have been other issues in which we are perceived as not following Holy Scripture.

This accusation that we don't believe in the Bible seems rather odd considering that our founder John claimed that he was a man of one Book. We need to unpack what Wesley meant. Fundamentalist Christians are a people of One Book because they believe in the inerrant Word of God. This means that God wrote all scripture. The author might have had the writing instrument in their hand, but God literally did the rest. We believe that God did indeed inspire the author to write their books and letters. We also believe that human beings are fallible with limited knowledge and the capacity to sin. Scriptures can point us toward God and God's will, but how can we through human language ever capture the wonder and mystery of God?

Wesley said that he was a man of One Book because for him everything necessary for our future salvation and for our wholeness as Christians can be found in scripture. Scripture doesn't address every issue of life but it serves for us a guide and inspiration to live a Christ-like life. Jesus Christ is the way of salvation. The Bible serves as the primary source for Christian living for Wesley, but he encouraged pastors that he appointed to circuits to read other books as well. Wesley was a prolific reader and writer. He was very open to the knowledge gained through the natural and social sciences. We don't treat the Bible as our science book because the Bible is not interested, like science, in how the word began, but who is behind it all and why are we here. The sciences have helped us to understand, for instance, that homosexuality is not a mere choice. People are oriented to be either heterosexual or homosexual.

This may sound a little simplistic, but as United Methodists we can take the Bible seriously without having to take every word literally.

In my next column, I will address Wesley's use of other sources that help us to interpret scripture that has become known as the Wesley Quadrilateral.

Grace and peace to you in the hope that is ours in Christ.

When the kids were little, we liked to walk in county or state parks. It was not uncommon for Rachel to see a toad or frog and pick it up. You know the inevitable question: 'Dad, can we keep her?'

I would explain. 'Rachel, that little frog has a mom, maybe a dad or grandpa or little brother, and soon they will start missing her. She will want to go home to her table for supper, and you can imagine how sad it would be for them if their little girl did not come home. She will miss them. They will miss her. Let's let her go so she can hop home.'

I don't know if that was a gold standard answer, but both kids learned empathy. They are kind to animals. They live out Christian love even if they do not set worship attendance records. Rachel is a social worker who manages others and engages the most challenged of those who live in Milwaukee without housing. Once, someone who was distressed asked the police to call her by name. Andrew loves to serve. Siblings in Christ, we belong to each other. Archbishop Tutu of South Africa has described life as 'a bundle of belonging.'

In her book, Who Do We Choose to Be? Margaret Wheatley says a decent human being must be willing to serve an inhumane and indecent time. More than being decent, what might a Christian be willing to do in an inhumane, indecent time?

Despite the fact that the federal government has built a concentration camp in Florida and has resorted to burning food aid rather than feed hungry children, I am still answering angry letters from the <u>Council of Bishops' epiphany letter</u>, read in our churches, that sought dignity for immigrants.

I feel as if I am crouching down in my gentle fatherly voice and saying, 'the 34 people per cage have a mother, a sister, or a child. They are exposed to the elements and live in their own stench. Most are guilty of no crime. For the first offense, being in the US illegally is a misdemeanor, and when did misdemeanor crimes warrant incarceration in a concentration camp away from family and legal recourse? Their children are traumatized from missing their fathers. Let them go. Let them go back to their dinner tables.'

Bishop Tom Berlin, our bishop assigned to the Florida conference, has raised his opposition to a concentration camp_built in Florida that costs \$450 million per year to operate. Inmates are given food infested with maggots. Mosquitoes, some carrying disease, are everywhere. The lights are left on so inmates cannot sleep. Of course, immigration reform is needed. Of course, persons who have committed serious crimes must be addressed. How do you defend a concentration camp with your Christian faith? Might the FEMA money used to maintain this be better spent in Texas or on a natural disaster?

Siblings in Christ, we have been divided by powerful, moneyed voices. Many hearts have been turned to revile immigrants by allowing ourselves to fear them in the most criminal terms. Consider how many United Methodists approve of this example of structural and systemic racism. Who would want to join that church?

Contact your representative and your senator. Join in prayer and protest. Feed those widowed because their husband has been swept up in a needless raid. Contribute to the Texas flood relief through UMCOR or a short-term mission trip. Love your neighbor. The neighbor, says Luke 10:37, is the one who showed mercy.

Know that your witness to Jesus and your service of the reign of God is critically important. Thank you for your witness and faithfulness. It is good to be in ministry with you.
